

Mirrored Minds

Søren Kierkegaard and Hans Christian Andersen

Kate Ashton

In her unique dual biography, Kate Ashton delineates the parallel lives of Hans Christian Anderson and Søren Kierkegaard, their personal relationship, literary careers, and lasting cultural influence on the western and wider world. These two towering literary geniuses followed radically divergent paths, and yet each read and reacted to the immense power and depth of the other's growing oeuvre as it refracted their own. Against the backdrop of the end of Golden Age Denmark within a warring Europe, and the spiritual and sexual repression of Reformed Christianity, each suffered the fate of the prophet unhonoured in his hometown of Copenhagen.

Tracing their lives from childhood trauma to tragic love affairs and anguished isolation, Ashton illuminates counteractive response to experience: one an inward search for truth and self-knowledge, the other flight into distraction and fantasy. *Mirrored Minds* offers the reader an opportunity to explore each author and his legacy within the context of the other, just as their long-standing association held up a mirror for Anderson and Kierkegaard themselves.

Kate Ashton is a writer and translator. Having begun her editorial career with Nursing Times in the 1970s, she has since published full-length fiction and non-fiction, and poetry. She lived in the Netherlands for twenty-five years, working as corrector and translator on English-language texts including for business-to-business magazines, the Frankfurt Book Fair, and the Frisian Academy. Since returning to Scotland in 2003, she reads, reviews, and translates from Dutch and Frisian.


George Cruikshank's Life, Times and Art

Volume II: 1835-1878

Robert L. Patten

George Cruikshank's (1792-1878) etchings and woodengravings graced the pages of such classics as Grimms' *Fairy Tales* and Dickens' *Oliver Twist*, campaigned in the propaganda war against Napoleon, and satirised his times, becoming representative of the age. His life crossed paths with Britain's primary political, social, and cultural leaders, yet he experienced a long struggle for recognition of his imaginative, versatile and incisive images.

In the concluding volume of this comprehensive biography, Patten examines Cruikshank's collaborations with renowned writers such as Harrison Ainsworth, Charles Dickens, and William Makepeace Thackeray. Focussing on his illustrated periodicals, including the long-standing Comic Almanack, as well as his advocacy of Temperance, Patten sketches the context of Cruikshank's art through his subjects, motifs, mediums, treatments, publishers and audiences. Engaging with the contradictory and crisis-filled latter years of Cruikshank's life, Patten reveals the great artist's refashioning in the Victorian Era.



Great Grandmama's Weekly

A Celebration of the Girl's Own Paper

Wendy Forrester

The Girl's Own Paper was first published in January 1880, and by the end of the nineteenth century, it was welcoming a quarter of a million readers to its weekly pages of advice on the concerns of the age; from playing hockey and keeping hens to curtseying at court and balancing the budget. Its Melodramatic serials and romances delighted readers from a future Queen of England, through the daughters of country houses and rectories, to housemaids in industrial cities, and from six-year-olds to grandmothers!

A remarkable selection of extracts from *The Girl's Own Paper* 1880-1901, *Great Grandmama's Weekly* illuminates the Victorian Era through these lively extracts and reveals how the concerns and experiences of the readers of *The Girl's Own Paper* continue to resonate today, exploring self-improvement, better pay, diet and cosmetics, cookery, crafts, and music. Wendy Forrester has curated a fascinating window on the era, allowing readers to see through the eyes of their great grandmothers.

The Girl's Own Paper was published by the Religious Tract Society (which later became the Lutterworth Press), from 1880 to 1956. Offering a combination of stories and educational and improving articles, it was highly influential for generations of young British women and girls, and provided an outlet for many female writers.

As an aid to researchers, collectors and others interested in the literature of the period, the Lutterworth Press now hosts The Girl's Own Paper Index, a fully searchable index to the articles and authors from 1880–1941 (Volumes 1–62).

Deserted Medieval Villages


Edited by Maurice Beresford and John G. Hurst

Updating Beresford's classic *The Lost Medieval Villages of England*, this book refreshes his historical research, considers the economic circumstances of desertion, and includes detailed maps, photographs and tables.



Professor M. W. Beresford (1920-2005) had an abiding interest in the evidence of maps for reconstructing the appearance of the English countryside in the past, which led to several reference publications. He was also a Professor of Economic History in the University of Leeds, and the first Chairman of the School of Economic Studies.

J.G. Hurst (1927-2003) was the Inspector of Ancient Monuments for the Ministry of Public Building and Works, a founding member of the Society for Medieval Archaeology and President of the Society for Post-Medieval Archaeology.

The History of Morris Dancing, 1458-1750

John Forrest

Morris dancing, one of the more peculiar of the English folk customs, has been greatly misunderstood. In *The History of Morris Dancing, 1458-1750* John Forrest analyses a wealth of evidence to show that Morris dancing does not, as is often assumed, have pagan or ancient origins. He examines early documentation to draw Morris traditions into the wide area of communal custom and public celebrations, showing the passage of dance ideas between groups previously considered folklorically distinct.

Careful, detailed and encyclopaedic, *The History of Morris Dancing, 1458-1750*, is an essential reference work for specialists in English drama and social historians of the period, as well as offering fascinating insight for those who enjoy Morris dancing.


R.C. Hutchinson

The Man and His Writing Barry Webb

In *R.C. Hutchinson*, Barry Webb reclaims the legacy of a highly-acclaimed, yet often forgotten writer. Despite having been awarded the Sunday Times Gold medal for fiction, the W.H.Smith award for the best novelist of the year, being short-listed for the Booker Prize, and several of his 17 novels becoming best-sellers in the UK and America, Hutchinson has not withstood the test of time compared to his contemporaries. Combining Hutchinson's own reflections with insightful critical analysis, Webb traces Hutchinson's thoughtful, observational life alongside his extraordinary literary output. He draws out how Hutchinson's firmly held Christian beliefs allowed him to eschew didacticism for nuanced reflections on the nature of human suffering.

Part biography, part critical study, *R.C. Hutchinson* sheds light on this influential and gifted writer, contextualising his work and highlighting his genius. He was described by Sebastian Faulks as a 'mid-century master of the genre', and by Cecil Day Lewis as 'one of the very few living novelists who will be read fifty – even a hundred years hence'. Webb offers readers the opportunity to re-discover this exceptional writer.



Stories in Glass

A Guide to Medieval Stained Glass in Norfolk

David King and Paul Harley

Norfolk's churches are home to some of the highestquality and best-preserved medieval stained glass in Britain. Panels produced in the county's extensive and long-lasting workshops, centred in the historically important city of Norwich, can be found in some 270 buildings, including churches, museums and country houses. Moreover, recent research has revealed for the first time the original location of many of the panels now dispersed around the county.

In *Stories in Glass*, Paul Harley and David King reveal these treasures to a new audience. Harley's exquisite photographs are set alongside historical and artistic explanations that illuminate the social, economic and religious background to the windows we see today. With 200 colour images, and maps showing the locations of the windows discussed, this beautifully illustrated guide will appeal to the explorer and collector alike.

David King was born into a family of glaziers and took up his own interest in stained glass in 1970. He writes regularly on painted window glass, and is the author of *The Medieval Stained Glass of St Peter Mancroft* (2006), and forthcoming CVMA Summary Catalogue for Norfolk. He has previously been a senior research fellow at the University of East Anglia.

Paul Harley is a photographer with over 35 years' experience. Past exhibition subjects have ranged from human rights abuses in South and Central America to medieval churches. His first book, *From Bears to Bishops: Norfolk's Medieval Church Carvings*, was published in 2018, and shortlisted for the East Anglian Book Awards.


Reading as if for Life

Spirituality for Booklovers

David Dickinson

Creaking open the pages of a heavy hardback, or bending the spine of a poetry book over your knee on the train; squinting over curled-up pages by the light of a candle, or scribbling notes in the margins in the corner of a sprawling library. There are many who read as if for life; many for whom, as David Dickinson explores, reading does not just feed the mind but also the soul.

Reading as if for Life takes us beyond the spirituality of sacred texts, and into the spiritual possibilities of 'secular' literature: the opportunity to find or empty oneself, the chance to engage in silent conversation with an absent other, the appreciation of beauty and art, the possibility of enlightenment. From Augustine of Hippo to Thomas Hardy, Iris Murdoch, the poetry of R.S. Thomas, Duffy and Donne, and many other literary works, David Dickinson explores how writers throughout the centuries have understood and experienced their own spirituality of reading. For Dickinson, these myriad journeys all bring us closer to an encounter with God, dreaming ourselves into a world beyond. This book invites its readers to see reading as a valuable spiritual exercise.

Salute the Everlasting Day

John Donne and Romanos the Melodist in Dialogue

Chrysostom Koutloumousianos

In Salute the Everlasting Day Chrysostom Koutloumousianos transcends time, location and culture to bring two great minds together. Preeminent sixth century hymnographer of the Greek-speaking East, Romanos the Melodist, and the most enthralling poet and preacher of early modern England, John Donne, meet in passionate dialogue. The poets' similarities and divergences are explored, their poetic and theological brilliance is demonstrated in a comparative context, and unfolded is the connection between the eschatological Kingdom and the transfiguration of the human being in this present life.

Using direct quotations from their literary corpus, as well as tailoring to the needs of a living dialogue, and elaborating on their teachings, Koutloumousianos presents the first comparative study of Romanos the Melodist and John Donne in all its sensitivity and beauty, capturing their shared vision for contemporary society.

Chrysostom Koutloumousianos is the abbot of the Holy Monastery of Faneromeni in Naxos, Cyclades. He previously spent thirty-five years as a Senior Elder at Koutloumous Monastery on Mount Athos. He holds a BA in English Literature and a BA, MA and PhD in Theology from the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki. He has had research grants at several academic institutions in the U.K. and has authored multiple books and articles on monasticism and patristics, including *The One and the Three* (James Clarke & Co., 2015).


Reckless Christianity

Citing its charismatic senior leader, Bill Johnson, as promoting a 'reckless' Christianity, Pivec and Geivett return to Scripture, the authoritative Word of God, to provide guidance on the boundaries of practice and where these boundaries are crossed. In its pursuit of experimentation, *Reckless Christianity* argues that the leaders of Bethel are pulling its followers into a dangerously speculative and experience-driven Faith.



This edition of *The Saints' Everlasting* Rest brings the classic Christian devotional, written by Richard Baxter during a life-threatening illness, to the modern reader. 

Spotlight: Joyful Revolution

Diana Skelton

At the age of 20, Mary Rabagliati (1942-1992) quit a secretarial job in London to move to an emergency housing camp in France without running water or any sanitation facilities. It was 1962 when, amongst that bleak squalor and deprivation, she began a lifelong commitment to anti-poverty work and fighting for the human rights of people on the margins of society, working towards a vision that no one should have to live a life trapped by poverty. She joined fellow trailblazer Joseph Wresinski to build the foundations for ATD Fourth World to develop into an international human rights movement. Particularly committed to the girls and women whose horizons were drastically curtailed by hardship, early motherhood, and domestic violence, Mary's work took her across continents: living alongside families in poverty; speaking out at the United Nations; and helping to spark a joyful revolution for social justice.

Drawing from her own personal experiences with Mary as mentor and housemate, Diana Skelton's deeply insightful and enriching biography *Joyful Revolution* provides the opportunity for Mary's distinctive voice to be heard in her native language for the first time, allowing people who never met this remarkable woman to discover her story. Filled with anecdotes, correspondence, journal entries, and more, this biography is a testament to the impact Mary Rabagliati had on the lives around her. As she said, 'In the misery of poverty, joy matters even more [...] so that people excluded from society can finally join in everything that makes the world extraordinary.'
